BCUC Minister's Message



Folks at BCUC are brimming with excitement as they prepare for Christmas. I walked into the entryway and noticed the Christmas wreaths decked with dazzling lights. I entered the main hall and I was greeted with the hanging green garlands with deep red and gold ribbons shining with anticipation. The sanctuary too is adorned once more with a tree, poinsettias, greenery and decorations, preparing for the arrival of Christmas. This must be a place of grace, I noted, a place where hope, peace, joy and love will again blossom in the hearts of people. Advent is here and then Christmas will soon come.

The season of Advent, a time of waiting and preparing, can be overwhelming to many of us, perhaps even puzzling. The Bible readings I am preaching on the four Sundays of Advent have nothing to do with birth stories. Instead we hear the prophet Jeremiah

telling us about a righteous branch who will bring justice and righteousness to the people who seemingly have lost hope. There is also a passage of hope when Isaiah invokes God to "comfort, comfort my people." We are challenged to reflect on the prophet Ezra and the restoration of the temple in Jerusalem as the exiled people return to their homeland. We hear again of Mary visiting Elizabeth, pregnant women in the gospel of Luke, and how they interact and exchange blessings as the babies in their wombs leap for joy! All these readings are in anticipation of the coming birth of Jesus.

The birth of Jesus was not a one-time event, but a ritual we repeat over and over again. Advent reminds us that every heart is called to prepare a room, as creation groans in eager longing for justice, peace and the love which shatters oppression, hatred and violence. And we will sing a favourite Advent hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" that speaks soulfully to us.

Come, God-with-us, as footprints in the snowy path and show us the way.

Come to bring the homeless home.

Dear friends.

Come to give food to the hungry.

Come, Emmanuel, to the coldness of our hearts and the pains of our world.

Come, take away our fears and journey with us toward Bethlehem where the star shines through the darkness, casting the light of peace and justice into our lives, into the whole world.

This Advent, I hope and pray that we will give in to the wonder and grace we know is alive in our lives. Let us celebrate the beginning of a new season of hope, the season of waiting, wondering and expectation.

On behalf of Ken, Justin and Jacob, I wish you all Advent blessings and a Christmas that is merry and meaningful.
